


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Writing America: Literary Landmarks From Walden Pond To Wounded Knee (A Reader's Companion)

The book considers not only the traditional sites for literary tourism, such as Mark Twainâ™s sumptuous Connecticut home and the peaceful woods surrounding Walden Pond, but also locations that highlight the diversity of American literature, from the New York tenements that spawned Abraham Cahanâ™s fiction to the Texas pump house that irrigated the fields in which the farm workers central to Gloria AnzaldÃ³aâ™s poetry picked produce. Rather than just providing a cursory overview of these authorsâ™ achievements, acclaimed literary scholar and cultural historian Shelley Fisher Fishkin offers a deep and personal reflection on how key sites bore witness to the struggles of American writers and inspired their dreams. She probes the global impact of American writersâ™ innovative art and also examines the distinctive contributions to American culture by American writers who wrote in languages other than English, including Yiddish, Chinese, and Spanish.
